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

'Sickening': GOP explodes at Biden over ANWR decision

Republicans and irate Alaska lawmakers slammed the Biden administration Wednesday after the White House said it would cancel the last remaining oil leases in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

The move, which came alongside new limits on oil leasing in the National Petroleum Reserve-Alaska, prompted cheers from most Democrats, but a furious response from the GOP and the bipartisan Alaska delegation, who said the cancellation not only broke legal contracts but would weaken the United States and lead to higher energy prices.

Some, like Sen. Dan Sullivan (R-Alaska), could barely contain their anger. He said he was "livid," while calling the decision "sickening." Rep. Mary Peltola, the state's lone Democrat in Congress, said she was "frustrated." Sen. Lisa Murkowski, an Alaska Republican, told reporters on Capitol Hill on Wednesday evening that it was "incredible to think that people are going to trust this administration on anything related to oil in Alaska again." Murkowski, a moderate who <u>swayed President Joe Biden</u> earlier this year to greenlight the Willow project, a controversial drilling plan in Alaska, was asked whether there was anything she could do to pressure the administration to reverse course — or to show them the political consequences of their actions. Murkowski said only "Yes," and then smiled and did not respond when asked if she could further elaborate. Murkowski is the top Republican on the subcommittee that funds the Interior Department and other environment agencies. It's unclear whether she could succeed in adding language to forthcoming legislation in the

Democratic-controlled Senate.

In addition to circumventing the Interior Department to compel the White House to approve the \$8 billion Willow project, Murkowski had success in lobbying the Biden administration to replace its initial pick for deputy Interior secretary, Elizabeth Klein, with a nominee viewed as more favorable to Alaskan energy priority, Tommy Beaudreau.

Klein has since been named as director of the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, a position leading the public oil, gas and wind programs off the nation's coasts.

Murkowski had also stood alongside Senate Energy and Natural Resources Chair Joe Manchin (D-W.Va.) in pledging to block confirmation of Laura Daniel-Davis, Biden's nominee for assistant secretary for lands and mineral management at Interior who has become a proxy for the wrath of pro-fossil fuel lawmakers looking to punish the administration for its energy agenda.

Daniel-Davis is serving as Interior's principal deputy assistant secretary of lands and minerals management. Like Klein's post, it is a position that does not require Senate confirmation.

In March, Manchin said he would not support Daniel-Davis' nomination, citing what he said was the Biden administration's appeasing of "radical activists" in the environmental community.

In a statement Wednesday, Manchin called the latest move "yet another example of this administration's caving to the radical left with no regard for clear direction from Congress or American energy security."

He added, "This is another attempt to use executive action to circumvent a law to accomplish what this administration does not have the votes to achieve in Congress. Canceling valid leases, removing acreage from future sales, and attempting to reduce production in Alaska while taking steps to allow Iran and Venezuela to produce more oil — with fewer environmental regulations — makes no sense and is frankly embarrassing." He did not indicate future plans to hold up other nominees on the grounds of his displeasure.

'We're livid'

The seven oil and gas leases announced for the chopping black Wednesday were sold by the Trump administration in 2021, just days before President Joe Biden took office and pledged to stand in the way of drilling in the pristine refuge.

Located on Alaska's northern coastline, the 19-million-acre refuge could hold more than 10 billion barrels of oil, offering a boon to the state's declining production.

But ANWR exploration has been held back for decades, thanks to Democratic lawmakers and campaigns by some Alaska Natives and environmental groups.

That long standoff was reversed in 2017, when the Republican-led Congress passed a tax overhaul, including a rider inked by Murkowski to create an oil program in the refuge's coastal plain.

It ordered two lease auctions by 2024. The first was carried out by the Trump administration. The outlook for the second sale under the Biden administration is unclear.

The administration Wednesday released a draft supplemental environmental review of the Trump administration's oil program in the refuge, arguing that it was legally flawed.

But Sullivan, in an interview on Capitol Hill, called the Biden administration's reversal "a legal charade" that constituted "complete abdication of following the rule of law."

"We're livid," Sullivan continued. "Who the hell in their right mind would invest money in a lease sale when they just watched the first lease sale get yanked? ... It's not only frustrating; it's sickening."

He echoed Murkowski in suggesting there will be an effort to push back or reverse the decision, but did not give specific details.

Peltola said in a statement that the Biden administration had shown it was "capable of listening to Alaskans with the approval of the Willow Project" but has failed to do that with ANWR.

"It is some of those same Inupiat North Slope communities who are most impacted by this decision," Peltola continued. "I will continue to advocate for them and for Alaska's ability to explore and develop our natural

resources, from the critical minerals we need for our clean energy transition to the domestic oil and gas we need to get us there."

In addition to revoking the oil and gas leases this week, the Biden administration said it would beef up protections in the National Petroleum Reserve-Alaska.

The 23-million-acre reserve is the largest swath of public lands in the country. Biden is proposing to solidify current leasing restrictions that cover nearly half the reserve with an explicit ban on new oil and gas leasing on 10.6 million acres.

Election-year politics

With a presidential election year looming, Biden's new Arctic oil decisions are sure to become a political barb for Republicans who have accused the White House of misguided energy policy since 2021.

Sen. John Barrasso, a Wyoming Republican and ranking member of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, has used that perch to criticize the White House for reining in oil and gas. He called the new Alaska oil and gas prohibitions part of a "war on American energy."

"With the stroke of a pen, his administration is placing more than 40 percent of the National Petroleum Reserve off limits for petroleum production," he said in a statement. "Not only is this bad energy policy, it's bad foreign policy."

But Democrats defended the president's efforts in the Arctic this week as a necessity for the climate — and a check on the lingering pro-oil policies of the Trump era.

House Natural Resources Committee ranking member Raúl Grijalva (D-Ariz.) said the ANWR oil and gas program was riddled with legal flaws, including a failure to fully consider a range of alternatives on leasing and to adequately explore the potential downstream greenhouse gas contributions of leasing decisions.

"Of all the Trump administration's shameless gifts to Big Oil, the ANWR leasing program had to be one of their most egregious," he said in a statement.

He added: "The ANWR lease sale never should have happened. I'm glad to see the Biden administration putting our legal and moral responsibilities to protect our environment, listen to tribes, and do right by American taxpayers above polluter profits."

Subject: President's Budget FY2025 Onshore Receipts Estimate Request - DUE Thursday, November 16th

All,

Let's get this party started!

We have not yet received updated guidance from OMB for the 2025 President's Budget (PB) and are still assuming the timelines described in the A-11 are good. The 2025 President's Budget requires the recalculation of receipt estimates for the Department based on updated economic and policy assumptions and will be compared to the 2024 President's Budget across the 10-year budget window. While we wait for final guidance, we are sending this request to get you started preparing your data. The timeline always feels compressed, so we want to give you as much notice as possible.

Good news! ONRR's Actual Data for this exercise is attached to this email. We will pass on the OMB Economic Assumptions as soon as we receive them. Economic Assumptions are scheduled to be released on **Thursday**,

November 9th. Of course, as you know, OMB may adjust the Economic Assumptions release date slightly, and POB is committed to forwarding them to you as soon as they become available. *Reminder: A delay in the Economic Assumptions does not adjust the listed deadlines*.

The data you provide is important to us! As we continue to capture lessons learned from each budget cycle, we are identifying ways to improve our data collection and integrity while ensuring leadership can quickly and easily understand your submissions. We continue to strive to strengthen management controls, improve Bureau ownership over numbers, and reduce risk in program outputs. By working together with you, we continue to ensure accurate receipt estimates in all our budget submissions.

As a part of our lessons learned from the 2024 President's Budget, POB piloted two deliverables during the 2024 Mid-Session cycle and collected feedback to finalize the requirements for these deliverables for the 2025 President's Budget. In addition to your customary estimate submissions, please plan to prepare the following:

- 1. **Executive Summary:** To communicate your estimates and assumptions more accurately through Departmental leadership and OMB, we are requesting a brief, narrative executive summary to accompany the commodity estimates. We know you'll be working quickly, so you have latitude on the format, but please make sure your summary minimally answers the following questions for the relevant commodities in your submission (e.g., oil, gas, renewable energy, coal, etc.):
 - a. What are the key assumptions included in your estimates?
 - b. How are these assumptions different than what was assumed in the last President's Budget?
 - c. What key policy decision and/or legislative direction are reflected in your assumptions?
 - d. How much of the estimated increase/decrease over the 10yr budget window is a result of the new economic assumptions vs other programmatic/policy assumptions?
 - e. How do your assumptions reflect current Administration priorities?

You will note on the schedule that we have staggered the due dates: your number estimates are due to POB first, followed by the narrative summary, the 10yr Explanations, and confirmation of estimates the following week. We know you need to focus on preparing the numbers first, then pulling the narrative about the assumptions together should hopefully be pretty straightforward.

- 2. **Bureau Entry of 10-year Bullet Explanations:** As we did in Mid-Session, we will leverage the POB External Communications SharePoint site to allow bureaus access to a shared document to provide bulleted explanatory notes for the estimates. We will update an Excel template that shows the outputs from the prior submission, the current submission, and the delta you provide quick notes about what caused the delta for each of the specific commodities.
 - a. **Note:** Keep in mind that your explanations for the lowest level commodity breakout may be different than the overall trend for a commodity. For example, oil and gas pricing in total may be decreasing, but a subset of oil and gas (say, rents and bonuses in a particular area, for example) may be *increasing* because of different lease sale or production assumptions. Please be sure your line-item commodity level explanation tracks with the delta for each line (so you don't talk about decreases on a line that's clearly increasing, etc.). If you have questions about this, please let us know.

Good news: These explanations are likely to form the more detailed basis for the explanations of assumptions you'll be providing in your Executive Summaries, so we believe these two tasks work nicely in tandem.

Clearance Requirements: We anticipate continued high levels of interest, significant leadership engagement, and additional review for receipt estimates again this cycle. To ensure adequate coordination, <u>please clear your</u> submission data and underlying assumptions through your Assistant Secretary by November 21st to finalize your submission. We recognize clearance of your inputs is generally standard practice, so we don't expect this to be a heavy lift. We are flagging the importance of clearance since we expect additional questions about the impact of statutory and policy direction on your assumptions and estimates.

A few process/procedure reminders:

1. **Use The Shared Mailbox**: All receipts data submissions must be submitted to POB via the shared Energy Receipts email (OS POB Receipts@ios.doi.gov) Use of this shared email allows better coverage and backup for this important function.

- 2. Remember to Submit Bureau-Populated Upload Templates: Please continue to complete the attached upload template with the appropriate estimates in thousands of dollars (in addition to your customary backup submissions). Your template will be uploaded directly into the receipts estimation and allocation model (REAM). Please do not make any formatting changes to the template(s). They are formatted specifically to upload into the model. Simply enter your updated estimates on the appropriate row in thousands of dollars.
- 3. **Bureau Validation**: Once estimates are uploaded in REAM, POB will ask you to confirm the estimates have been uploaded correctly (e.g. amounts are correctly reflected, correct values in the correct fiscal years, etc.) If you find something is in error, simply provide us a revised upload template with the corrected data, and we'll upload again until it's right.

OS POB Receipts@ios.doi.gov by Thursday, November 16th. As soon as we have uploaded your estimates, we will circle back with you for confirmation that the estimates have been uploaded correctly so you can get started loading your 10yr Explanations on our shared space HERE. We anticipate the explanations will be ready for you by Friday, November 17th. All 3 deliverables (the estimates, the executive summary(s) and the 10yr explanations) should be finalized and reviewed through your Assistant Secretary by Tuesday, November 21st. A detailed schedule, with as much information as we know right now, is below:



The revisions are to the following slides, there are also two questions. Revisions are based on the most recent information posted on the BLM-Alaska web sites. The questions do not need to be answered to prepare the presentation, but the presenter (hopefully Steve Cohn) should be prepared to answer them.

Slide 3 - date changed to November 2023. The BLM presentation is scheduled for Wednesday, November 29.

Slide 12 - Central Yukon RMP. The current slide notes that the public comment period ended June 9, 2021. The plan web site says a final will be issued late in 2021. Is there more up to date information on the status of the final plan development?

Slide 15 - Revocation of 17(d)(1) Withdrawals - Is there a timeline for completing the re-evaluation of the (d)(1) withdrawals? The revisions simplify the last two bullets, deleted dates, they now read as follows:

- BLM is re-evaluating previous decisions to revoke 28 million acres of withdrawals
- DOI opened 28 million acres of withdrawals to allow for Native Veteran Allotment applications

Slide 16 - Vietnam Veteran Allotments. The slide has three revisions:

- 1) updated the available acreage for selection to 29 million acres (from 28.3 million acres), based on the added 812,000 acres mentioned in slide 15
- 2) updated the number of applications to 327 (from BLM web site, dated 10/10/2023)
- 3) included that 14 have been certified (also from BLM web site 10/10/2023),

The fifth and sixth bullets on slide 16 now read:

- 29 million acres of BLM lands available for selection
- As of October 2023, BLM had received 327 applications and has certified 14

Slide 18 - ANWR 1002 - changed the last two bullets (bullets 5 and 6) to read:

- January 2021 First lease sale held, leases subsequently relinquished or cancelled
- September 2023 BLM and USFWS issued Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement for lease sales

Slide 19 - NPRA - added revised bullet #6 and added new bullet #7 - "BLM issued Proposed Rule regarding management of Protected Areas in NPRA.

- In April 2022 BLM adopted a "No Action" alternative, essentially reverting to the 2013 IAP
- September 2023 BLM issued Proposed Rule for management of protected areas in NPRA








On October 18, AIDEA filed the attached complaint in DC District Court challenging the September 6 cancellation of AIDEAs leases, naming DOI, the Secretary, BLM, and the BLM Director as defendants. The complaint alleges violations of the Tax Act, APA, due process clause of the Constitution and DOI's regulations governing lease terminations. The complaint seeks a declaratory judgment invalidating DOI's lease cancellation and other relief. The federal response will be due in 60 days from service of the lawsuit.

Also pending are two motions from Plaintiffs/Intervenor-Plaintiffs in the AIDEA v Biden case seeking relief from the court's summary judgment order in August, with a reply to the motion to amend/reconsider and a new motion to vacate the summary judgment order both filed by Plaintiffs/Intervenor-Plaintiffs on Tuesday evening. We're working thru how to respond to the motions and the new lawsuit.

Sara and Steve,

The Native Village of Kaktovik and its tribal members want to extend our warmest thank you for your decision following our February 13, 2023 Cooperative Agency meeting in Kaktovik and the letter sent to you both requesting to cancel the ITEK meeting on February 22, 2023. I want to apologize for not sending this sooner but it has taken some time for us to fully comprehend that we were listened to by you. Thank you for listening. It gives us hope that we can express our thoughts on the issues that need to be addressed by us under the SEIS process. As we have stated, we would rather address the apparent deficiencies with the EIS, and based on an email we received from Mr. Cohn on September 8, 2023 we understand them to be the four items listed below.

"The ongoing SEIS development process will address the two deficiencies identified in SO 3401 plus any additional specific resource related issue(s), set forth a revised range of alternatives, and facilitate the analysis of the following issues:

- 1. Revision of the Reasonably Foreseeable Development (RFD) scenario to allow for consideration of an alternative that considers less than 2,000 acres of surface development.
- 2. Conduct additional analysis related to foreign greenhouse gas emissions and consider any new information related to subsistence resources (e.g., fish, marine mammals, caribou) and subsistence use/access which may inform any reconsideration of compliance under Section 810 of the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA), and any other targeted resource.
- 3. A wider range of development outcomes related to the RFD scenario (considering impacts of less than 2,000 acres of surface development) while also reanalyzing other resources.
- 4. Reconsideration of lease stipulations and Required Operating Procedures (ROP) (including new potential mitigation measures) across alternatives based on revised RFD scenario and additional analysis"

We have been hopeful that our meetings would allow us to weigh in on these items, which is why we focused on them through our comments on the Lease Stipulations (LS) and Required Operating Procedures (ROP) in our February 13 meeting. As our comments and our letter clearly stated we felt the focus on ITEK was premature and overwhelming, while creating the appearance of cultural trespass of our homelands. None of the agenda items were focused on the items above but instead were designed to allow tribal people who have never stepped foot on the Coastal Plain to establish some sort of traditional knowledge. We were completely dumbfounded and caught off guard with this approach.

Now that the ITEK Workshop and future ITEK Working Group meetings have been cancelled, again thank you for doing this, we would like to have another G2G meeting to begin discussion on the four items above.

It is not until we better know what suggested changes the agencies are contemplating that we can begin to incorporate indigenous knowledge into the process. There is no blanket form of traditional and indigenous knowledge that we can provide at this point – our knowledge comes into play when we know the specifics of the changes being proposed. For instance, with regard to the four items listed above we have reviewed the LS and ROPs as identified in item 4 above. We have been hoping that we could begin to discuss our proposed revisions to the LS' and ROPs by going through them at our meeting. We understand that the changes in items 2 – 4 may lead to new LS and ROPs but we feel that discussing our concerns with the existing ROPs will help inform us in how to respond to any new LS' and ROPs.

We would also like to discuss items 1 and 3 and how you calculated the gravel needs for the two RFD's presented in the EIS. We are familiar with development in and around Nuiqsut and into NPR-A through our involvement in the NPR-A Working Group, and through listening to the public meetings on projects, and also through downloading the EIS' and SEIS' and reviewing as they work through the process. We do not recall any discussions the 2,000 acres of gravel allocations for the Reasonably Foreseeable

Development (RFD) scenario in the earlier EIS G2G meetings and now after reviewing the Draft Summary of 'Indigenous Traditional Ecological Knowledge (ITEK) Documented On Behalf Of Coastal Plain Oil & Gas Leasing Program In Cooperation With The Native Village Of Kaktovik' sent to us on February 13 it appears that we did not provide any comments on the RFD scenarios that were developed for the EIS. We would like you to understand that placement of gravel is important to us even if it is for a scenario for Leasing and we would like to be able to provide our comments on any and all potential future placement of gravel.

Again, it is with genuine thanks of your efforts to listen us as a people and to subsequently cancel the ITEK Workshop that we are writing. We are encouraged and are gaining our strength to continue our engagement positively from this point forward.

As a aside, it is also important for you to understand, not as an excuse but as an actuality of life in our community, we have had telecommunications outages over the last week otherwise we would have been able to send this to you sooner.

As you are aware, the House Natural Resources Subcommittee on Energy and Mineral Resources plans to hold a legislative hearing on H.R. 6285, Alaska's Right to Produce Act (attached).

H.R. 6285 would:

- Require the BLM to withdraw the proposed NPR-A rule, and prohibit substantially similar rules from being proposed by the BLM;
- Prohibit the President or Secretary of the Interior from placing any moratorium or other pause of oil and gas leasing in the Coastal Plain;
- Aim to approve all authorizations, permits, etc., as discussed in the Record of Decision for the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program that was published August 21, 2020;
- Require the Secretary to reissue the canceled leases in the Arctic Refuge within 30 days of enactment;
- Withdraw the Draft Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program Supplemental EIS;
- Declare that no court shall have jurisdiction over the review of past decisions regarding the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program; and
- Nullify Executive Order 13990 and Secretarial Order 3401.

HQ-620 has prepared the draft statement (also attached and pasted below) with staff level input from BLM-AK. Following HQ-100 review and surname, we will provide the testimony to ASLM and OCL for further clearance.

H.R. 6285, Alaska's Right to Produce Act

November 29, 2023

Chairman Stauber, Ranking Member Ocasio-Cortez, and Members of the Subcommittee, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on H.R. 6285, the Alaska's Right to Produce Act.

BLM Overview

Since its inception in 1946, the BLM has served as a steward of our nation's Federal public lands and resources. The passage of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 (FLPMA) provided the BLM with the multiple use and sustained yield mandate that guides all of the BLM's land management decisions. Driven by our mission, the BLM sustains the health, diversity, and productivity of the nation's public lands for multiple uses, such as conventional and renewable energy development; livestock grazing; conservation; mining; watershed protection; and hunting, fishing, and other forms of recreation. This multiple-use and sustained yield mission enables the BLM to contribute tremendously to economic growth, job creation, and domestic energy production, while generating revenues for Federal and State treasuries and local economies, and allowing for a thoughtful and balanced approach to management of our public lands.

Under its multiple use and sustained yield mission, the BLM manages approximately 245 million surface acres across the nation, located primarily in 12 western states. The BLM is also responsible for managing 700 million subsurface acres, many of which are overlain by properties managed by other Federal agencies, such as the Department of Defense and the U.S. Forest Service. Further, of these 700 million subsurface acres, approximately 57 million acres are split estate lands, where the surface estate is in private ownership and the BLM manages the subsurface minerals.

Alaska Oil & Gas Development

In Alaska, BLM manages more surface and subsurface acres than any other state with BLM-managed lands. This includes over 70 million surface acres and 220 million subsurface acres in a state with a landmass equivalent to about one-fifth of the entire contiguous United States. In fiscal year 2022, the BLM's management of public lands in Alaska supported more than 2,570 jobs, with a total economic impact of more than \$578.1 million.

As part of managing the Federal onshore oil and gas leasing program in Alaska, the BLM issues permits for geophysical exploration, permits to drill oil and gas wells, and authorizations to construct pads and install production facilities. Federal oil and gas leasing in Alaska is concentrated in three regions: the Cook Inlet Region on both sides of the Cook Inlet, and the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska (NPR-A) and the Coastal Plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (Arctic Refuge), the latter two located on Alaska's north slope. The State of Alaska receives 90 percent of rents and royalties from Federal oil and gas leases in the Cook Inlet Region, and the State receives 50 percent of the bonus bids, rents, and royalties from both the NPR-A and Coastal Plain.

Arctic National Wildlife Refuge

The 1.56 million-acre Arctic Refuge oil and gas program area, also referred to as the "Coastal Plain," is located along the coast of the approximately 19.3 million-acre Arctic Refuge on Alaska's North Slope. Specifically, the

program area is within the northwestern portion of the refuge and immediately adjacent to the Beaufort Sea (Arctic Ocean), which is located to the north.

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act (P.L. 115-97) directed the BLM to conduct two oil and gas lease sales in the Coastal Plain of the Arctic Refuge that offer at least 400,000 acres of lands for bid by December 2024, which are to be managed similar to the administration of lease sales under the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act of 1976 and its applicable regulations. The BLM conducted its first lease sale in the Coastal Plain of Arctic Refuge on January 6, 2021, pursuant to the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program August 2020 Record of Decision (ROD), with any future oil and gas development actions requiring a separate detailed environmental analysis. Since that time, two of the three companies holding leases have separately requested to have their leases rescinded and to receive a refund. The remaining seven leases were canceled by the Department of the Interior earlier in 2023. As such, there are currently no leases in the Coastal Plain.

President Biden, though Executive Order 13990, directed the Department to review oil and gas leasing in the Refuge, "[i]n light of the alleged legal deficiencies underlying the program." In June 2021, Secretarial Order 3401 suspended all activities related to implementing the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program, pending completion of a comprehensive analysis under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). Pursuant to the order, the BLM is preparing a supplemental environmental impact statement (SEIS) which addresses the deficiencies identified in the Secretarial order. The draft SEIS released by the BLM and the U.S Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) contained an analysis that informed the Department's determination that the 2021 lease sale was based on fundamental legal deficiencies, such as insufficient analysis under NEPA; failure to adequately analyze a reasonable range of alternatives and properly quantify downstream greenhouse gas emissions; and failure to properly interpret the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. Accordingly, Secretary Haaland determined that the seven oil and gas leases issued by the previous Administration in the Arctic Refuge should be cancelled. The public comment period for the draft SEIS closed on November 7, 2023, after holding ten public meetings, of which four were virtual. Though the comment period is closed, the BLM welcomes the opportunity for further Government-to-Government consultation with Tribes.

National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

Located approximately 100 miles to the west of the Arctic Refuge, the NPR-A is a vast area on Alaska's North Slope composed of approximately 23 million acres. In 1923, President Harding set aside this area as an emergency oil supply for the U.S. Navy due to the area's petroleum value. In 1976, in accordance with the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act, administration of the reserve was transferred to the BLM.

The NPR-A generates tens of millions of dollars in oil and gas revenue each year and remains an important resource for meeting America's energy needs. Most notably, the recently approved Willow project is expected to produce 180,000 barrels of oil per day at its peak, and is projected to deliver up to \$17 billion in new revenue for the Federal government, the State of Alaska, and North Slope Borough Native communities. The Willow project is designed and conditioned by the BLM to coexist as much as possible with subsistence activities.

The BLM is proposing a new rule to govern the management of surface resources and Special Areas in the NPR-A, consistent with its duties under the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act of 1976 (NPRPA), FLPMA, and other authorities. Under NPRPA, Congress directed the BLM to balance oil and gas development with the management and protection of sensitive landscapes – known as Special Areas – and surface resources across the reserve. The proposed rule would revise the framework for designating and assuring maximum protection of Special Areas' significant resource values, as directed in the NPRPA, and would protect and enhance access for subsistence activities throughout the NPR-A. It would also incorporate aspects of the NPR-A Integrated Activity Plan that was approved in April 2022.

Upon finalization of the proposed rule, the BLM will follow the proposed process to inform the creation or expansion of additional Special Areas in the NPR-A. The proposed rule would have no effect on currently authorized oil and gas operations in the NPR-A. The BLM is currently accepting comments on the proposed rule through December 7, 2023, and has held five public meetings and met with multiple Alaska Native organizations. The BLM continues to engage with communities, Tribes, and Alaska Native Corporations to

ensure the local communities have ample opportunities to provide robust and substantive comments on the proposed rule.

H.R. 6285, Alaska's Right to Produce Act

H.R. 6285 would prohibit the President or Secretary of the Interior from placing any moratorium or other pause of oil and gas leasing in the Coastal Plain. H.R. 6285 also aims to approve all authorizations, permits, etc., as discussed in the Record of Decision for the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program that was published August 21, 2020. Additionally, the bill would require the Secretary to reissue the canceled leases in the Arctic Refuge within 30 days of enactment, and withdraw the Draft Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program Supplemental EIS. The bill further declares that no court shall have jurisdiction over the review of past decisions regarding the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program. The bill would also require the BLM to withdraw the proposed NPR-A rule, and would prohibit substantially similar rules from being proposed by the BLM. Finally, H.R. 6285 would nullify Executive Order 13990 and Secretarial Order 3401.

Analysis

The BLM strongly opposes H.R. 6285, as the Coastal Plain leases were cancelled after a careful review of all available information. As a result of its review, the Department determined that the leases were improperly issued due to pre-leasing legal defects, and the record evaluated by the Department confirmed the seriousness of those legal defects in the environmental reviews for the leases. To reinstate the leases and revert to the flawed analysis would be detrimental to the Coastal Plain leasing program and would undermine future Federal oil and gas related activities in the area. Having a sound, legally defensible environmental analysis is a necessary foundation for subsequent actions, such as development plans and applications to drill.

Additionally, the BLM is actively accepting comments on the proposed NPR-A rule. The proposed NPR-A rule does not change the current management of the area. It would establish a new framework for balancing development with the protection of Special Areas – lands that harbor significant subsistence, recreational, fish and wildlife, historical and scenic values – and the management of surface resources throughout the NPR-A. This framework would improve the BLM's ability to respond to changing conditions in the Arctic while providing transparency and stability in conservation and development decisions. The proposed regulations would also enhance protections for subsistence uses and resources throughout the NPR-A, particularly within the Teshekpuk Lake, Utukok River Uplands, and other Special Areas.

Conclusion

The BLM remains committed to ensuring that the Federal oil and gas program serves the best interests of the American people by promoting the highest industry, environmental, and public engagement standards and securing a fair return for the American taxpayer. The BLM is working diligently to move the oil and gas program in Alaska forward through the Draft SEIS and NPR-A rule. H.R. 6285 reverts the BLM's oil and gas program in Alaska back to standards that have been determined to be inadequate, and therefore, the BLM strongly opposes the bill.

As you are aware, the House Natural Resources Subcommittee on Energy and Mineral Resources plans to hold a legislative hearing on H.R. 6285, Alaska's Right to Produce Act (attached).

H.R. 6285 would:

- Require the BLM to withdraw the proposed NPR-A rule, and prohibit substantially similar rules from being proposed by the BLM;
- Prohibit the President or Secretary of the Interior from placing any moratorium or other pause of oil and gas leasing in the Coastal Plain;
- Aim to approve all authorizations, permits, etc., as discussed in the Record of Decision for the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program that was published August 21, 2020;
- Require the Secretary to reissue the canceled leases in the Arctic Refuge within 30 days of enactment;
- Withdraw the Draft Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program Supplemental EIS;
- Declare that no court shall have jurisdiction over the review of past decisions regarding the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program; and
- Nullify Executive Order 13990 and Secretarial Order 3401.

H.R. 6285, Alaska's Right to Produce Act

November 29, 2023

Chairman Stauber, Ranking Member Ocasio-Cortez, and Members of the Subcommittee, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on H.R. 6285, the Alaska's Right to Produce Act.

The North Slope of Alaska includes lands that sustain people, wildlife, and fish in northern Alaska and are part of a vast landscape of rich cultural traditions and thriving ecological diversity. Both the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (Arctic Refuge) and the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska (NPR-A) are located on the North Slope. The Arctic Refuge – approximately the size of South Carolina – is located on the traditional homelands of the Iñupiat and Gwich'in peoples. The lands and waters are a critical home to migratory and resident wildlife, and have unique recreational values. In the NPR-A, Tribal Nations have occupied the lands since time immemorial, and over 40 communities continue to harvest subsistence resources that rely on the reserve, including caribou, shore and waterbirds, and many other fish and wildlife species. The Department of the Interior (Department) balances resource development with the management and protection of the sensitive landscapes and surface resources.

On September 8, 2023, the BLM published a proposed rule to update its regulations for the management and protection of the NPR-A. The proposed rule aims to update the regulatory framework, which was established nearly 45 years ago, to respond to the dramatically changing conditions in the Arctic. This proposed rule ensures the Bureau of Land Management continues to meet the statuary direction under the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act (NPRPA) and Federal Land Policy and Management Act (FLPMA) and other authorities to the best of its ability.

H.R. 6285, strips the BLM of the tools necessary to appropriately manage the NPR-A to ensure maximum protection of Special Areas, while also protecting subsistence activities and ensuring a balance for surface resources in future oil and gas activities in the NPR-A, as directed in the NPRPA. The bill also reduces opportunities for meaningful public input and engagement on that management.

Similarly, the bill would undermine the public input and evaluation required under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), prohibiting the BLM from addressing identified deficiencies in the previous review governing potential leasing in the Coastal Plain of the Arctic Refuge, and cutting out the public from that process. In addition, the bill would interfere with the Department's ability to fulfill its obligation to manage the Arctic Refuge for all of the purposes stated in the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA), which like the NPRPA, include protection of fish and wildlife habitats and subsistence activities.

Given these concerns, the BLM strongly opposes H.R. 6285.

BLM Overview

Since its inception in 1946, the BLM has served as a steward of our nation's Federal public lands and resources. The passage of the FLPMA provided the BLM with the multiple use and sustained yield mandate that guides all of the BLM's land management decisions. Driven by our mission, the BLM sustains the health, diversity, and productivity of the nation's public lands for multiple uses, such as conventional and renewable energy development; livestock grazing; conservation; mining; watershed protection; and hunting, fishing, and other forms of recreation. This multiple-use and sustained yield mission enables the BLM to contribute tremendously to economic growth, job creation, and domestic energy production, while generating revenues for Federal and State treasuries and local economies, and allowing for a thoughtful and balanced approach to management of our public lands.

Under its multiple use and sustained yield mission, the BLM manages approximately 245 million surface acres across the nation, located primarily in 12 western states. The BLM is also responsible for managing 700 million subsurface acres, many of which are overlain by properties managed by other Federal agencies, such as the Department of Defense and the U.S. Forest Service. Further, of these 700 million subsurface acres, approximately 57 million acres are split estate lands, where the surface estate is in private ownership and the BLM manages the subsurface minerals.

The BLM also carries out its management responsibilities in accordance with other applicable legal authorities, such as the NEPA. In Alaska, the BLM implements the ANILCA, the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act, and the NPRPA as part of its management of public lands and minerals.

Alaska Oil & Gas Development

In Alaska, BLM manages more surface and subsurface acres than any other state with BLM-managed lands. This includes over 70 million surface acres and 220 million subsurface acres in a state with a landmass equivalent to about one-fifth of the entire contiguous United States. In fiscal year 2022, the BLM's management of public lands in Alaska supported more than 2,570 jobs, with a total economic impact of more than \$578.1 million.

As part of managing the Federal onshore oil and gas leasing program in Alaska, the BLM issues permits for geophysical exploration, permits to drill oil and gas wells, and authorizations to construct pads and install production facilities. Oil and gas leasing in Alaska is concentrated in three regions: the Cook Inlet Region on both sides of the Cook Inlet, the NPR-A, and the Coastal Plain of the Arctic Refuge, the latter two located on Alaska's north slope. The State of Alaska receives 90 percent of rents and royalties from Federal oil and gas leases in the Cook Inlet Region, and the State receives 50 percent of the bonus bids, rents, and royalties from both the NPR-A and Coastal Plain.

Arctic National Wildlife Refuge

The 19.3 million-acre Arctic Refuge, managed by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, was originally established in 1960 and expanded in 1980 through ANILCA, which specified the purposes of the Refuge:

- (i) to conserve fish and wildlife populations and habitats in their natural diversity including, but not limited to, the Porcupine caribou herd (including participation in coordinated ecological studies and management of this herd and the Western Arctic caribou herd), polar bears, grizzly bears, muskox, Dall sheep, wolves, wolverines, snow geese, peregrine falcons and other migratory birds and Arctic char and grayling;
- (ii) to fulfill the international treaty obligations of the United States with respect to fish and wildlife and their habitats;
- (iii) to provide, in a manner consistent with the purposes set forth in subparagraphs (i) and (ii), the opportunity for continued subsistence uses by local residents; and
- (iv) to ensure, to the maximum extent practicable and in a manner consistent with the purposes set forth in paragraph (i), water quality and necessary water quantity within the refuge.

The Refuge is managed by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service and all activities are reviewed for compatibility with the statutory purposes. The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act (P.L. 115-97 – Tax Act) added another purpose to the Arctic Refuge, to provide for an oil and gas program on the Arctic Coastal Plain, while retaining the existing purposes.

The 1.56 million-acre Arctic Refuge oil and gas program area, also referred to as the "Coastal Plain," is located along the coast of the Arctic Refuge on Alaska's North Slope. Specifically, the program area is within the northwestern portion of the refuge and immediately adjacent to the Beaufort Sea (Arctic Ocean), which is located to the north.

Specifically, the Tax Act directed the BLM to conduct two oil and gas lease sales in the Coastal Plain of the Arctic Refuge that offer at least 400,000 acres of lands for bid by December 2024, which are to be managed in a manner similar to the administration of lease sales under the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act of 1976 and its applicable regulations. The BLM conducted its first lease sale in the Coastal Plain of the Arctic Refuge on January 6, 2021, pursuant to the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program August 2020 Record of Decision (ROD), with any future oil and gas development actions requiring a separate detailed environmental analysis. Since that time, two of the three companies holding leases have separately requested to have their leases rescinded and to receive a refund. The remaining seven leases were canceled by the Department earlier in 2023. As such, there are currently no leases in the Coastal Plain.

President Biden, though Executive Order 13990, directed the Department to review oil and gas leasing in the Refuge, "[i]n light of the alleged legal deficiencies underlying the program." In June 2021, Secretarial Order 3401 suspended all activities related to implementing the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program, pending completion of a comprehensive analysis under the NEPA. Pursuant to the order, the BLM and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service are preparing a supplemental environmental impact statement (SEIS) addressing the deficiencies identified in the Secretarial Order. The Draft SEIS released on September 6, 2023 by the BLM and the U.S Fish and Wildlife Service contains an analysis that informed the Department's determination that the 2021 lease sale was based on fundamental legal deficiencies, such as insufficient analysis under NEPA; failure to adequately analyze a reasonable range of alternatives and properly quantify downstream greenhouse gas emissions; and failure to properly interpret the Tax Act. Accordingly, Secretary Haaland determined that the seven oil and gas leases issued by the previous Administration in the Arctic Refuge should be canceled. The public comment period for the Draft SEIS closed on November 7, 2023, after holding ten public meetings, of which four were virtual. Though the comment period is closed, the BLM welcomes the opportunity for further Government-to-Government consultation with Tribes and Alaska Native Corporations, and can also meet with other entities, such as local governments like the North Slope Borough, seeking to clarify the comments they have submitted.

National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

Located approximately 100 miles to the west of the Arctic Refuge, the NPR-A is a vast area on Alaska's North Slope composed of approximately 23 million acres. In 1923, President Harding set aside this area as an emergency oil supply for the U.S. Navy due to the area's petroleum value. In 1976, in accordance with the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act, administration of the reserve was transferred to the BLM. Under the NPRPA, Congress directed the BLM to balance oil and gas development with the management and protection of sensitive landscapes – known as Special Areas – and surface resources across the Reserve.

The NPR-A generates tens of millions of dollars in oil and gas revenue each year and remains an important resource for meeting America's energy needs. Most notably, the recently approved Willow project is expected to produce 180,000 barrels of oil per day at its peak, and is projected to deliver up to \$17 billion in new revenue for the Federal government, the State of Alaska, and North Slope Borough Native communities. The Willow project is designed and conditioned by the BLM to coexist as much as possible with subsistence activities.

The BLM is proposing a new rule to guide implementation of its obligations to for management of surface resources generally and Special Areas more specifically in the NPR-A, consistent with the direction in the NPRPA, as well as FLPMA and other authorities. The proposed rule would revise the framework for designating and assuring maximum protection of Special Areas' significant resource values, as directed in the NPRPA, and would protect and enhance access for subsistence activities throughout the NPR-A. It would also incorporate aspects of the NPR-A Integrated Activity Plan that was approved in April 2022.

Upon finalization of the proposed rule, the BLM would follow a more specific process to inform the creation or expansion of additional Special Areas in the NPR-A and the protection of access and resources for subsistence, and would continue to manage the Reserve subject to an Integrated Activity Plan, ensuring transparency and opportunities for public input, as well as consultation. The proposed rule would apply to future leasing and oil and gas activities, and would not affect currently authorized oil and gas operations in the NPR-A. The BLM is currently accepting comments on the proposed rule through December 7, 2023. Through this 90-day comment period, the BLM has held public meetings, engaged in consultation, and met with multiple Alaska Native organizations and local government entities, as well as the NPR-A Working Group. The BLM continues to engage with communities, Tribes, and Alaska Native Corporations to ensure that local communities have ample opportunities to provide robust and substantive comments on the proposed rule.

H.R. 6285, Alaska's Right to Produce Act

H.R. 6285 would prohibit the President or Secretary of the Interior from placing any moratorium or other pause of oil and gas leasing in the Coastal Plain. H.R. 6285 also aims to approve all authorizations, permits, etc., as discussed in the Record of Decision for the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program that was published August 21, 2020. Additionally, the bill would require the Secretary to

reissue the canceled leases in the Arctic Refuge within 30 days of enactment, and withdraw the Draft Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program Supplemental EIS. The bill further declares that no court shall have jurisdiction over the review of past decisions regarding the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program. The bill would also require the BLM to withdraw the proposed NPR-A rule, and would prohibit substantially similar rules from being proposed by the BLM. Finally, H.R. 6285 would nullify Executive Order 13990 and Secretarial Order 3401.

Analysis

The BLM strongly opposes H.R. 6285. The Coastal Plain leases were canceled after a careful review of all available information. As a result of its review, the Department determined that the leases were improperly issued due to pre-leasing legal defects, and the record evaluated by the Department, including in the Draft SEIS, confirmed the seriousness of the legal defects in the environmental reviews for the leases. To reinstate the leases and revert to the flawed analysis would be detrimental to the Coastal Plain leasing program and would undermine future Federal oil and gas related activities in the area. Having a sound, legally defensible environmental analysis is a necessary foundation for subsequent actions, such as development plans and applications to drill.

Additionally, the BLM is actively accepting comments on the proposed NPR-A rule. The proposed NPR-A rule does not change the current management of the area. It would establish a new framework for balancing development with the protection of Special Areas – lands that harbor significant subsistence, recreational, fish and wildlife, historical and scenic values, including areas identified by Congress in the NPRPA – and the management of surface resources throughout the NPR-A. This framework would improve the BLM's ability to respond to changing conditions in the Arctic while providing transparency and stability in conservation and development decisions. The proposed regulations would also enhance protections for subsistence uses and resources throughout the NPR-A, which are especially reliant on the Special Areas, including the Teshekpuk Lake and Utukok River Uplands Special Areas.

Conclusion

The BLM remains committed to ensuring that the Federal oil and gas program serves the best interests of the American people by promoting the highest industry, environmental, and public engagement standards and securing a fair return for the American taxpayer. The BLM is further implementing the direction in the governing law to balance oil and gas leasing and development with explicit requirements to protect fish and wildlife, recreation and subsistence in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge and the National Petroleum Reserve Alaska. The BLM is working diligently to move the oil and gas program in Alaska forward through the Draft SEIS and NPR-A rule. H.R. 6285 reverts the BLM's oil and gas program in Alaska back to standards that have been determined to be inadequate. Therefore, the BLM strongly opposes the bill.



Biden-Harris Administration Takes Major Steps to Protect Arctic Lands and Wildlife in Alaska

Department of the Interior cancels oil and gas leases in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge; proposes new protections in National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

WASHINGTON — The Biden-Harris administration today announced significant steps to protect the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (Arctic Refuge) and more than 13 million acres in the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska (NPR-A). These bold actions to protect the Arctic region build on President Biden's <u>historic conservation and climate agenda</u>, which already includes protecting more than 21 million acres of public lands and waters across the nation, and securing the Inflation Reduction Act, the largest investment in climate action in history.

In the Arctic Refuge, Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland has authorized the cancellation of the remaining seven oil and gas leases issued by the previous administration in the

Coastal Plain. The leases were suspended in June 2021 following the issuance of <u>Secretary's Order (S.O.) 3401</u>, which identified "multiple legal deficiencies in the underlying record supporting the leases."

In addition, the Department today <u>proposed new regulations</u> for the NPR-A that would ensure maximum protection for the more than 13 million acres of Special Areas in the reserve, while supporting subsistence activities for Alaska Native communities. The proposed rule, <u>previewed in March 2023</u>, adds to President Biden's actions to protect millions of acres of lands and waters in the Arctic, including withdrawing approximately 2.8 million acres of the Beaufort Sea, ensuring the entire United States Arctic Ocean is off limits to new oil and gas leasing.

"With climate change warming the Arctic more than twice as fast as the rest of the planet, we must do everything within our control to meet the highest standards of care to protect this fragile ecosystem," said **Secretary Haaland**. "President Biden is delivering on the most ambitious climate and conservation agenda in history. The steps we are taking today further that commitment, based on the best available science and in recognition of the Indigenous Knowledge of the original stewards of this area, to safeguard our public lands for future generations."

Lease Cancellations in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge

Following passage of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (Tax Act), the previous Administration held an oil and gas lease sale in the Arctic Refuge's Coastal Plain on January 6, 2021, and issued 10-year leases on nine tracts covering more than 430,000 acres. On January 21, 2021, President Biden issued Executive Order 13990, directing the Department to review oil and gas leasing in the Refuge, "[i]n light of the alleged legal deficiencies underlying the program." S.O. 3401 directed a new, comprehensive analysis of the potential environmental impacts of the Coastal Plain Leasing Program. Since that time, two of the issued leases have been canceled and refunded at the request of the lessees. The remaining seven leases held by the sole lessee covered 365,000 acres in the Coastal Plain.

The Secretary of the Interior has the authority to cancel or suspend oil and gas leases issued in violation of a statute or regulation. The draft supplemental environmental impact statement (SEIS) released today by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) developed information supporting the Department's determination that the 2021 lease sale was seriously flawed and based on a number of fundamental legal deficiencies, including: insufficient analysis under the National Environmental Policy Act, including failure to adequately analyze a reasonable range of alternatives and properly quantify downstream greenhouse gas emissions; and failure to properly interpret the Tax Act. Accordingly, Secretary Haaland has determined that the leases issued by the previous administration in the Arctic Refuge shall be cancelled.

Protections in the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

Extending from the northwest slope of the Brooks Range to the Arctic Coast, the NPR-A encompasses roughly 23 million acres of public land managed by the BLM. Tribal Nations have occupied lands now within the NPR-A since time immemorial, and over 40 Indigenous communities continue to rely on subsistence activities in the reserve, harvesting caribou, shore and waterbirds, and many other fish and wildlife species, with many communities subsisting primarily from food harvested from the NPR-A.

Under the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act (NPRPA) of 1976, Congress directed the BLM to balance oil and gas development with the management and protection of sensitive landscapes – known as Special Areas – and surface resources across the reserve. The proposed rule is designed to assure maximum protection of Special Areas, as authorized under the NPRPA. The proposed rule would require that protections for Special Areas remain in place for as long as the values and characteristics in those areas are present, ensuring the durability of the protections into the future. The proposed rule also would require the BLM to review and gather public input – at least every five years – on whether existing special areas should be expanded, whether new special areas should be designated, and whether additional resources within special areas should be identified for protection. Upon finalization of the proposed rule, the Administration will follow this proposed process to inform the creation or expansion of additional special areas in the NPR-A.

The proposed rule would protect 13 million acres encompassed by the existing Special Areas by limiting future oil and gas leasing and industrial development in the Teshekpuk Lake, Utukok Uplands, Colville River, Kasegaluk Lagoon, and Peard Bay Special Areas – places collectively known for their globally significant intact habitat for wildlife, including grizzly and polar bears, caribou and hundreds of thousands of migratory birds. The rule would establish an outright prohibition on any new leasing in 10.6 million acres, more than 40 percent of the NPR-A.

The proposed rule would raise the bar for development throughout the NPR-A by establishing clear guidelines that are consistent with provisions of the current management plan for the reserve, the NPR-A Integrated Activity Plan (IAP). This current management plan for the reserve was put in place in 2022, and effectively reversed the previous administration's IAP that sought to expand oil and gas leasing and development in the NPR-A and reduce protections for the Special Areas.

The proposed rulemaking would help protect subsistence uses throughout the NPR-A, responding to Alaska Native communities who have relied on the land, water and wildlife to support their way of life for thousands of years. It also advances the Biden-Harris administration's commitment to strengthening the role of Tribal governments in the management of public lands by encouraging the BLM to explore co-stewardship opportunities with Tribes for the Special Areas.

Seeking Public Comment

There will be a 45-day public review and comment period on the draft SEIS for the Coastal Plain. In developing the draft, the BLM and FWS engaged with a wide variety of stakeholders and used the best available data and science, including Indigenous Knowledge. For additional information, go to <u>BLM's eplanning page</u>.

The proposed NPR-A rule and map of the five NPR-A Special Areas as delineated in the 2022 IAP, are available for preview. A forthcoming publication of the proposed rule in the Federal Register will open a 60-day public comment period. During that time, the BLM will host in-person meetings in communities on the North Slope, as well as virtual public meetings to discuss the proposed rule. Details of those opportunities will be made available soon.

Dear Mr. President,

Last week we saw significant decisions from your administration on conservation of public lands, but also fossil fuel development. As I reflect on these decisions and look forward to what is to come this week at your conservation summit in Washington, D.C., I write to urge you to direct your administration to develop a comprehensive climate plan for public lands that guarantees we meet our emissions and resilience goals while supporting communities. Further, we ask that you direct your administration to stop adding to climate disruption until a plan has been established. We must ensure that consequential projects like ConocoPhillips' Willow are no longer made in a vacuum, without the benefit of the considerations and direction that a comprehensive plan would provide.

A comprehensive climate plan for public lands must include: 1) phasing out drilling on public lands and waters while supporting communities in making an economic transition, 2) responsibly ramping up renewable energy infrastructure, 3) protecting natural carbon sinks, especially old growth and mature forests, 4) conserving lands for climate and community resiliency, and 5) centering community input and climate considerations when evaluating development projects. Specifically, we recommend that your administration undertake the following actions:

1. Phase out fossil fuel development on public lands and waters while supporting communities undergoing an economic transition

We recommend that your administration launch rulemakings to update the federal oil and gas program and to align the Department of the Interior's actions with a climate- and conservation-minded approach to managing public lands. To deliver on the promise of last summer's historic climate bill, it will take significant changes to how we manage fossil fuel development on public lands. Durably implementing policy changes included in the Inflation Reduction Act means enacting critical fiscal reforms and empowering the Department of the Interior to take lands off the table from oil and gas extraction. Your administration must also establish a system for factoring climate impacts into its leasing and permitting decisions. We call on your administration to halt further leasing, exploration and permitting in the Western Arctic (the Reserve) unless consistent with a final climate plan for public lands. Your administration should also cancel oil and gas leases in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge to protect another invaluable stretch of Alaska wilderness – those leases issued during the Trump years would add even more fossil fuels to the cycle of extraction and consumption that is driving climate change and degrading public lands. Furthermore, your administration should prioritize communities impacted by a fossil fuel phase out with funding and other resources to support a successful economic transition.

2. Responsibly ramp up renewable energy infrastructure

The Bureau of Land Management must ensure that public lands are part of that transition to a renewable energy economy – and that it does so responsibly, taking a comprehensive, landscape-level, smart-from-the-start approach to renewable energy. Your administration should update the 2012 Solar Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement and other policies that ensure responsible renewable energy development and center community and Tribal engagement. Your administration should not have to choose between its commitments to climate protection, biodiversity conservation, Tribal sovereignty and environmental justice.

3. Protect natural carbon sinks like old growth and mature forests

We recommend that the U.S. Forest Service undertake a climate-focused rulemaking that prioritizes the conservation of mature and older forests from logging, wildfire, drought and other climate stressors, emphasizes carbon storage, watershed conservation, and habitat connectivity and engages in meaningful co-management of forest lands with Indigenous partners. Natural climate solutions play an important role in mitigating overall carbon emissions, and a key natural climate solution is the conservation of older forests, given they are uniquely productive at capturing and storing carbon. Experts find ecologically intact older forests to be more resilient to climate-driven stressors, while providing clean air, water, key habitat and migration corridors for thousands of wildlife species across the nation.

4. Conserve lands for climate and community resiliency

We recommend that your administration designate and expand national monuments and wildlife refuges. Doing so would permanently protect large portions of public land that preserve wildlife habitat, significant cultural and historical sites, dwindling water sources and access points for nature-deprived communities who bear the unequal impacts of a warming climate. These designations should be used swiftly and broadly to leverage nature-based solutions to protect biodiversity and buffer us against the worst impacts of climate change. More federal designations will demonstrate your commitment to focus on "a whole-of-government approach" to promoting racial justice and respecting sovereign Tribes, addressing climate change, listening to the science and rebuilding our economy through job creation.

Further, the Bureau of Land Management must take a more aggressive approach that exercises its existing tools to prioritize nature conservation and biodiversity protection on the 245 million acres it manages in the United States. Currently, 90 percent of these lands are open to oil and gas leasing. The Bureau should direct managers to identify, evaluate and designate new protected areas critical for climate adaptation, habitat conservation and connectivity, and safeguarding cultural resources and community resilience. They should also strengthen designations like Areas of Critical Environmental Concern and others to ensure they meaningfully protect the historical and cultural values, water supplies, wildlife, grasslands and other natural systems they are designed to protect and that are critical in our ability to adapt to climate impacts. Many Bureau-managed lands are directly adjacent to rapidly growing population centers across the West, including Phoenix, Albuquerque, Denver and Las Vegas that depend on these lands for clean water, healthy ecosystems and vital outdoor recreation access.

5. Center community input and climate considerations when evaluating development projects

Your administration needs to center people in all its environmental reviews by improving public transparency, more meaningfully involving Tribal governments and communities of color and doing everything in the government's power to mitigate harmful impacts to frontline communities. Your administration has an opportunity to accomplish these critical objectives during the upcoming National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) rulemaking process. We call on your administration to fully restore, strengthen and modernize NEPA's implementing regulations, including by enshrining key provisions of the recent White House Council on Environmental Quality guidance pertaining to climate change impacts.

Together, this suite of recommendations would represent the kind of comprehensive climate plan for public lands that would truly harness their potential to help your administration meet its climate goals—and help to cement your climate legacy. Implementing these recommendations will require ambition, urgency and resolve. The climate crisis demands nothing less, and I am confident that your administration can deliver.

Thank you for your time and consideration. We look forward to continuing to work with you and your administration on these important issues.

AIDEA issues ANWR consulting RFP, wants to progress seismic permitting

The Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority has issued a request for proposals for consultancy work in conjunction with anticipated seismic surveying for the agency's oil and gas leases on the coastal plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. The agency is seeking a consultant to complete and prepare the environmental field work and documentation for the permitting of a multi-year seismic surveying program.

AIDEA says that it anticipates work being done under the proposed contract between Sept. 1, 2023, and Aug. 31, 2024, with the possibility of three additional one-year extensions. Bids must be delivered to AIDEA by Sept. 8, 2023.

Federal moratorium

Currently there is a federal moratorium on the permitting of any lease related work in ANWR, pending the completion of a supplementary environmental

impact statement for the ANWR lease sale program. Recently the federal District Court in Alaska rejected an appeal by AIDEA, the State of Alaska and others against the moratorium.

AIDEA has told Petroleum News that it has issued the RFP in anticipation of the imminent completion of the SEIS -- the agency wants to be able to move forward with its ANWR exploration activities as soon as possible, assuming that the moratorium will be lifted. It is also possible that some preparatory office work associated with the environmental permitting could be conducted while the moratorium is still in place.

The lease sale program

After many years, during which ANWR oil and gas leasing remained off limits, the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, passed by Congress in 2017, mandated two lease sales for the coastal plain. The Bureau of Land Management conducted the first of these lease sales in January 2021, with AIDEA, Knik Arm Services LLC and Regenerate Alaska purchasing leases in the sale. However, in 2021 the incoming Biden administration ruled that the lease sale EIS was deficient, with BLM then placing a moratorium on the permitting of ANWR lease related activities until the EIS had been reworked.

Knik Arm Services and Regenerate Alaska subsequently relinquished their leases, while AIDEA retained its leases.

BLM has indicated that it anticipates issuing the draft supplementary EIS in the third quarter of this year. The SEIS development is now running more than a year behind its original schedule.

A controversial program

There have been vehement arguments both for and against the lease sale program.

AIDEA, with its role of supporting business in Alaska, strongly endorses the opening of the ANWR coastal plain for oil and gas exploration and development -- the state of Alaska sees the potential for jobs and state revenues from oil and gas activities in the region. The North Slope Borough, Arctic Slope Regional Corp. and Kaktovik Inupiat Corp, the Native corporation for the only village in the ANWR coastal plain, have also expressed strong support for the leasing program.

Supporters of the program argue that the environment on the coastal plain can be adequately protected, and that any potential oil and gas development would have a relatively small surface footprint. The leasing program only applies to the coastal plain in the northerly part of the refuge.

The Gwich'in Native people of northern Alaska and Canada have, on the other hand, expressed strong objections to ANWR oil development. The Gwich'in are particularly concerned about the possible impact of oil industry activities on the Porcupine caribou herd that calves on the coastal plain and is a primary subsistence food source for them.

Environmental organizations are also strongly opposed to oil and gas activities in ANWR, arguing that these activities would cause irreparable damage to the natural environment in the refuge.

Biden-Harris Administration Takes Major Steps to Protect Arctic Lands and Wildlife in Alaska

Department of the Interior cancels oil and gas leases in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge; proposes new protections in National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

WASHINGTON — The Biden-Harris administration today announced significant steps to protect the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (Arctic Refuge) and more than 13 million acres in the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska (NPR-A). These bold actions to protect the Arctic region build on President Biden's historic conservation and climate agenda, which already includes protecting more than 21 million acres of public lands and waters across the nation, and securing the Inflation Reduction Act, the largest investment in climate action in history.

In the Arctic Refuge, Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland has authorized the cancellation of the remaining seven oil and gas leases issued by the previous administration in the Coastal Plain. The leases were suspended in June 2021 following the issuance of Secretary's Order (S.O.) 3401, which identified "multiple legal deficiencies in the underlying record supporting the leases."

In addition, the Department today proposed new regulations for the NPR-A that would ensure maximum protection for the more than 13 million acres of Special Areas in the reserve, while supporting subsistence activities for Alaska Native communities. The proposed rule, previewed in March 2023, adds to President Biden's actions to protect millions of acres of lands and waters in the Arctic, including withdrawing approximately 2.8

million acres of the Beaufort Sea, ensuring the entire United States Arctic Ocean is off limits to new oil and gas leasing.

"With climate change warming the Arctic more than twice as fast as the rest of the planet, we must do everything within our control to meet the highest standards of care to protect this fragile ecosystem," said **Secretary Haaland**. "President Biden is delivering on the most ambitious climate and conservation agenda in history. The steps we are taking today further that commitment, based on the best available science and in recognition of the Indigenous Knowledge of the original stewards of this area, to safeguard our public lands for future generations."

Lease Cancellations in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge

Following passage of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (Tax Act), the previous Administration held an oil and gas lease sale in the Arctic Refuge's Coastal Plain on January 6, 2021, and issued 10-year leases on nine tracts covering more than 430,000 acres. On January 21, 2021, President Biden issued Executive Order 13990, directing the Department to review oil and gas leasing in the Refuge, "[i]n light of the alleged legal deficiencies underlying the program." S.O. 3401 directed a new, comprehensive analysis of the potential environmental impacts of the Coastal Plain Leasing Program. Since that time, two of the issued leases have been canceled and refunded at the request of the lessees. The remaining seven leases held by the sole lessee covered 365,000 acres in the Coastal Plain.

The Secretary of the Interior has the authority to cancel or suspend oil and gas leases issued in violation of a statute or regulation. The draft supplemental environmental impact statement (SEIS) released today by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) developed information supporting the Department's determination that the 2021 lease sale was seriously flawed and based on a number of fundamental legal deficiencies, including: insufficient analysis under the National Environmental Policy Act, including failure to adequately analyze a reasonable range of alternatives and properly quantify downstream greenhouse gas emissions; and failure to properly interpret the Tax Act. Accordingly, Secretary Haaland has determined that the leases issued by the previous administration in the Arctic Refuge shall be cancelled.

Protections in the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

Tribal Nations have occupied lands now within the NPR-A since time immemorial, and over 40 Indigenous communities continue to rely on subsistence activities in the reserve, harvesting caribou, shore and waterbirds, and many other fish and wildlife species, with many communities subsisting primarily from food harvested from the NPR-A.

Under the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act (NPRPA) of 1976, Congress directed the BLM to balance oil and gas development with the management and protection of sensitive landscapes – known as Special Areas – and surface resources across the reserve. The proposed rule is designed to assure maximum protection of Special Areas, as authorized under the NPRPA. The proposed rule would require that protections for Special Areas remain in place for as long as the values and characteristics in those areas are present, ensuring the durability of the protections into the future. The proposed rule also would require the BLM to review and gather public input – at least every five years – on whether existing special areas should be expanded, whether new special areas should be designated, and whether additional resources within special areas should be identified for protection. Upon finalization of the proposed rule, the Administration will follow this proposed process to inform the creation or expansion of additional special areas in the NPR-A.

The proposed rule would protect 13 million acres encompassed by the existing Special Areas by limiting future oil and gas leasing and industrial development in the Teshekpuk Lake, Utukok Uplands, Colville River, Kasegaluk Lagoon, and Peard Bay Special Areas –

places collectively known for their globally significant intact habitat for wildlife, including grizzly and polar bears, caribou and hundreds of thousands of migratory birds. The rule would establish an outright prohibition on any new leasing in 10.6 million acres, more than 40 percent of the NPR-A.

The proposed rule would raise the bar for development throughout the NPR-A by establishing clear guidelines that are consistent with provisions of the current management plan for the reserve, the NPR-A Integrated Activity Plan (IAP). This current management plan for the reserve was put in place in 2022, and effectively reversed the previous administration's IAP that sought to expand oil and gas leasing and development in the NPR-A and reduce protections for the Special Areas.

The proposed rulemaking would help protect subsistence uses throughout the NPR-A, responding to Alaska Native communities who have relied on the land, water and wildlife to support their way of life for thousands of years. It also advances the Biden-Harris administration's commitment to strengthening the role of Tribal governments in the management of public lands by encouraging the BLM to explore co-stewardship opportunities with Tribes for the Special Areas.

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

Biden-Harris Administration Takes Major Steps to Protect Arctic Lands and Wildlife in Alaska

Department of the Interior cancels oil and gas leases in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge; proposes new protections in National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

WASHINGTON — The Biden-Harris administration today announced significant steps to protect the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (Arctic Refuge) and more than 13 million acres in the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska (NPR-A). These bold actions to protect the Arctic region build on President Biden's <u>historic conservation and climate agenda</u>, which already includes protecting more than 21 million acres of public lands and waters across the nation, and securing the Inflation Reduction Act, the largest investment in climate action in history.

In the Arctic Refuge, Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland has authorized the cancellation of the remaining seven oil and gas leases issued by the previous administration in the

Coastal Plain. The leases were suspended in June 2021 following the issuance of <u>Secretary's Order (S.O.) 3401</u>, which identified "multiple legal deficiencies in the underlying record supporting the leases."

In addition, the Department today <u>proposed new regulations</u> for the NPR-A that would ensure maximum protection for the more than 13 million acres of Special Areas in the reserve, while supporting subsistence activities for Alaska Native communities. The proposed rule, <u>previewed in March 2023</u>, adds to President Biden's actions to protect millions of acres of lands and waters in the Arctic, including withdrawing approximately 2.8 million acres of the Beaufort Sea, ensuring the entire United States Arctic Ocean is off limits to new oil and gas leasing.

"With climate change warming the Arctic more than twice as fast as the rest of the planet, we must do everything within our control to meet the highest standards of care to protect this fragile ecosystem," said **Secretary Haaland**. "President Biden is delivering on the most ambitious climate and conservation agenda in history. The steps we are taking today further that commitment, based on the best available science and in recognition of the Indigenous Knowledge of the original stewards of this area, to safeguard our public lands for future generations."

Lease Cancellations in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge

Following passage of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (Tax Act), the previous Administration held an oil and gas lease sale in the Arctic Refuge's Coastal Plain on January 6, 2021, and issued 10-year leases on nine tracts covering more than 430,000 acres. On January 21, 2021, President Biden issued Executive Order 13990, directing the Department to review oil and gas leasing in the Refuge, "[i]n light of the alleged legal deficiencies underlying the program." S.O. 3401 directed a new, comprehensive analysis of the potential environmental impacts of the Coastal Plain Leasing Program. Since that time, two of the issued leases have been canceled and refunded at the request of the lessees. The remaining seven leases held by the sole lessee covered 365,000 acres in the Coastal Plain.

The Secretary of the Interior has the authority to cancel or suspend oil and gas leases issued in violation of a statute or regulation. The draft supplemental environmental impact statement (SEIS) released today by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) developed information supporting the Department's determination that the 2021 lease sale was seriously flawed and based on a number of fundamental legal deficiencies, including: insufficient analysis under the National Environmental Policy Act, including failure to adequately analyze a reasonable range of alternatives and properly quantify downstream greenhouse gas emissions; and failure to properly interpret the Tax Act. Accordingly, Secretary Haaland has determined that the leases issued by the previous administration in the Arctic Refuge shall be cancelled.

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





RE: Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program

I am writing today on behalf of the Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation in Old Crow, Yukon to respectfully call on the Department of Interior to immediately initiate consultation with our government regarding the Coastal Plain Oil and Gas Leasing Program. I am also urging you to reach out to the leaders of the Gwich'in Tribal Council, the First Nation of Na-Cho Nyäk Dün, the Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in First Nation, and the Inuvialuit Game Council to rightfully offer opportunity for consultation with their governments. As you know, together we represent the governments of the First Nation users of the Porcupine caribou in what is now known as Canada.

I would like to start off by commending you for cancelling the remaining oil and gas leases in the Coastal Plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge; an area that serves as critical calving and post-calving grounds of the Porcupine Caribou herd and is known by the Gwich'in as *lizhik Gwats'an Gwandaii Goodlit* (The Sacred Place Where Life Begins). Your acknowledgment that the 2021 lease sale was seriously flawed and based on a number of legal deficiencies underscores concerns that we raised throughout the Environmental Impact Statement process which left significant legal, policy and technical concerns of ours unaddressed.

While I welcome this decision and your Order on June 1, 2021 which called for a comprehensive environmental analysis to review potential impacts and address legal deficiencies of the initial process, I remain deeply concerned that the Department of Interior has not yet initiated consultation with our governments or our communities as part of this process. Further, I understand that there was a commitment made by former Department of Interior Assistant Secretary Joe Balash during a meeting with Government of Canada representatives in May 2019 to consult directly with affected Indigenous governments in Yukon and Northwest Territories. This commitment remains unfulfilled.

This is a matter of great importance with the domestic and international rights of our people and the Agreement Between the Government of Canada and the Government of the United States of America on the Conservation of the Porcupine Caribou Herd (Agreement) being placed in jeopardy.

The Agreement acknowledges the custom and traditional use of the herd by people in Yukon and Northwest Territories in Canada and Alaska in the United States and states that we "should participate in the conservation of the Porcupine Caribou Herd and its habitat". Furthermore, the Agreement states "The Parties will ensure that the Porcupine Caribou Herd, its habitat and interests of users of Porcupine Caribou are given effective consideration in evaluating proposed activities within the range of the Herd".

On February 23, 2021, President Biden and Prime Minister Trudeau confirmed that the Government of Canada and the Government of the United States were united in recognizing the importance of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge and "agreed to work together to help safeguard the Porcupine caribou herd calving grounds that are invaluable to the Gwich'in and Inuvialuit people's culture and subsistence." This acknowledgement recognizes the magnitude that this area has on our Nations and further supports the need for consultation on this matter.

Protecting the Porcupine caribou is a matter of protecting our inherent and human rights. Opportunities for meaningful consultation within and independent of the Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement process, including but not limited to public meetings, should be provided to every potentially impacted community in Canada and Alaska so that you may hear concerns directly from our governments and our citizens and so that we can meaningfully share traditional knowledge from our communities.

I can tell you unequivocally that any development in the Coastal Plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge would have devastating impacts to the arctic ecosystems that we belong to. I recognize the work of the Administration to date and we look forward to continuing to work with the Government of Canada and the Government of the United States to ensure the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge is permanently protected for future generations.

Biden-Harris Administration Takes Major Steps to Protect Arctic Lands and Wildlife in Alaska

Department of the Interior cancels oil and gas leases in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge; proposes new protections in National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

WASHINGTON The Biden-Harris administration today announced significant steps to protect the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (Arctic Refuge) and more than 13 million acres in the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska (NPR-A). These bold actions to protect the Arctic region build on President Biden's historic conservation and climate agenda, which already includes protecting more than 21 million acres of public lands and waters across the nation, and securing the Inflation Reduction Act, the largest investment in climate action in history.

In the Arctic Refuge, Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland has authorized the cancellation of the remaining seven oil and gas leases issued by the previous administration in the Coastal Plain. The leases were suspended in June 2021 following the issuance of <u>Secretary's Order (S.O.) 3401</u>, which identified "multiple legal deficiencies in the underlying record supporting the leases."

In addition, the Department today <u>proposed new regulations</u> for the NPR-A that would ensure maximum protection for the more than 13 million acres of Special Areas in the reserve, while supporting subsistence activities for Alaska Native communities. The proposed rule, <u>previewed in March 2023</u>, adds to President Biden's actions to protect millions of acres of lands and waters in the Arctic, including withdrawing approximately 2.8 million acres of the Beaufort Sea, ensuring the entire United States Arctic Ocean is off limits to new oil and gas leasing.

"With climate change warming the Arctic more than twice as fast as the rest of the planet, we must do everything within our control to meet the highest standards of care to protect this fragile ecosystem," said Secretary Haaland. "President Biden is delivering on the most ambitious climate and conservation agenda in history. The steps we are taking today further

that commitment, based on the best available science and in recognition of the Indigenous Knowledge of the original stewards of this area, to safeguard our public lands for future generations."

Lease Cancellations in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge

Following passage of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (Tax Act), the previous Administration held an oil and gas lease sale in the Arctic Refuge's Coastal Plain on January 6, 2021, and issued 10-year leases on nine tracts covering more than 430,000 acres. On January 21, 2021, President Biden issued Executive Order 13990, directing the Department to review oil and gas leasing in the Refuge, "[i]n light of the alleged legal deficiencies underlying the program." S.O. 3401 directed a new, comprehensive analysis of the potential environmental impacts of the Coastal Plain Leasing Program. Since that time, two of the issued leases have been canceled and refunded at the request of the lessees. The remaining seven leases held by the sole lessee covered 365,000 acres in the Coastal Plain.

The Secretary of the Interior has the authority to cancel or suspend oil and gas leases issued in violation of a statute or regulation. The draft supplemental environmental impact statement (SEIS) released today by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) developed information supporting the Department's determination that the 2021 lease sale was seriously flawed and based on a number of fundamental legal deficiencies, including: insufficient analysis under the National Environmental Policy Act, including failure to adequately analyze a reasonable range of alternatives and properly quantify downstream greenhouse gas emissions; and failure to properly interpret the Tax Act. Accordingly, Secretary Haaland has determined that the leases issued by the previous administration in the Arctic Refuge shall be cancelled.

Protections in the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

Extending from the northwest slope of the Brooks Range to the Arctic Coast, the NPR-A encompasses roughly 23 million acres of public land managed by the BLM. Tribal Nations have occupied lands now within the NPR-A since time immemorial, and over 40 Indigenous communities continue to rely on subsistence activities in the reserve, harvesting caribou, shore and waterbirds, and many other fish and wildlife species, with many communities subsisting primarily from food harvested from the NPR-A.

Under the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act (NPRPA) of 1976, Congress directed the BLM to balance oil and gas development with the management and protection of sensitive landscapes – known as Special Areas – and surface resources across the reserve. The proposed rule is designed to assure maximum protection of Special Areas, as authorized under the NPRPA. The proposed rule would require that protections for Special Areas remain in place for as long as the values and characteristics in those areas are present, ensuring the durability of the protections into the future. The proposed rule also would require the BLM to review and gather public input – at least every five years – on whether existing special areas should be expanded, whether new special areas should be designated, and whether additional resources within special areas should be identified for protection. Upon finalization of the proposed rule, the Administration will follow this proposed process to inform the creation or expansion of additional special areas in the NPR-A.

The proposed rule would protect 13 million acres encompassed by the existing Special Areas by limiting future oil and gas leasing and industrial development in the Teshekpuk Lake, Utukok Uplands, Colville River, Kasegaluk Lagoon, and Peard Bay Special Areas – places collectively known for their globally significant intact habitat for wildlife, including grizzly and polar bears, caribou and hundreds of thousands of migratory birds. The rule would

establish an outright prohibition on any new leasing in 10.6 million acres, more than 40 percent of the NPR-A.

The proposed rule would raise the bar for development throughout the NPR-A by establishing clear guidelines that are consistent with provisions of the current management plan for the reserve, the NPR-A Integrated Activity Plan (IAP). This current management plan for the reserve was put in place in 2022, and effectively reversed the previous administration's IAP that sought to expand oil and gas leasing and development in the NPR-A and reduce protections for the Special Areas.

The proposed rulemaking would help protect subsistence uses throughout the NPR-A, responding to Alaska Native communities who have relied on the land, water and wildlife to support their way of life for thousands of years. It also advances the Biden-Harris administration's commitment to strengthening the role of Tribal governments in the management of public lands by encouraging the BLM to explore co-stewardship opportunities with Tribes for the Special Areas.

Seeking Public Comment

There will be a 45-day public review and comment period on the draft SEIS for the Coastal Plain. In developing the draft, the BLM and FWS engaged with a wide variety of stakeholders and used the best available data and science, including Indigenous Knowledge. For additional information, go to <u>BLM's eplanning page</u>.

The proposed NPR-A rule and map of the five NPR-A Special Areas as delineated in the 2022 IAP, are available for preview. A forthcoming publication of the proposed rule in the Federal Register will open a 60-day public comment period. During that time, the BLM will host in-person meetings in communities on the North Slope, as well as virtual public meetings to discuss the proposed rule. Details of those opportunities will be made available soon.



Biden-Harris Administration Takes Major Steps to Protect Arctic Lands and Wildlife in Alaska

Department of the Interior cancels oil and gas leases in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge; proposes new protections in National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

WASHINGTON — The Biden-Harris administration today announced significant steps to protect the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (Arctic Refuge) and more than 13 million acres in the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska (NPR-A). These bold actions to protect the Arctic region build on President Biden's historic conservation and climate agenda, which already includes protecting more than 21 million acres of public lands and waters across the nation, and securing the Inflation Reduction Act, the largest investment in climate action in history.

In the Arctic Refuge, Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland has authorized the cancellation of the remaining seven oil and gas leases issued by the previous administration in the Coastal Plain. The leases were suspended in June 2021 following the issuance of Secretary's Order (S.O.) 3401, which identified "multiple legal deficiencies in the underlying record supporting the leases."

In addition, the Department today proposed new regulations for the NPR-A that would ensure maximum protection for the more than 13 million acres of Special Areas in the reserve, while supporting subsistence activities for Alaska Native communities. The proposed rule, previewed in March 2023, adds to President Biden's actions to protect millions of acres of lands and waters in the Arctic, including withdrawing approximately 2.8 million acres of the Beaufort Sea, ensuring the entire United States Arctic Ocean is off limits to new oil and gas leasing.

"With climate change warming the Arctic more than twice as fast as the rest of the planet, we must do everything within our control to meet the highest standards of care to protect this fragile ecosystem," said **Secretary Haaland**. "President Biden is delivering on the most ambitious climate and conservation agenda in history. The steps we are taking today further that commitment, based on the best available science and in recognition of the Indigenous

Knowledge of the original stewards of this area, to safeguard our public lands for future generations."

Lease Cancellations in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge

Following passage of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (Tax Act), the previous Administration held an oil and gas lease sale in the Arctic Refuge's Coastal Plain on January 6, 2021, and issued 10-year leases on nine tracts covering more than 430,000 acres. On January 21, 2021, President Biden issued Executive Order 13990, directing the Department to review oil and gas leasing in the Refuge, "[i]n light of the alleged legal deficiencies underlying the program." S.O. 3401 directed a new, comprehensive analysis of the potential environmental impacts of the Coastal Plain Leasing Program. Since that time, two of the issued leases have been canceled and refunded at the request of the lessees. The remaining seven leases held by the sole lessee covered 365,000 acres in the Coastal Plain.

The Secretary of the Interior has the authority to cancel or suspend oil and gas leases issued in violation of a statute or regulation. The draft supplemental environmental impact statement (SEIS) released today by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) developed information supporting the Department's determination that the 2021 lease sale was seriously flawed and based on a number of fundamental legal deficiencies, including: insufficient analysis under the National Environmental Policy Act, including failure to adequately analyze a reasonable range of alternatives and properly quantify downstream greenhouse gas emissions; and failure to properly interpret the Tax Act. Accordingly, Secretary Haaland has determined that the leases issued by the previous administration in the Arctic Refuge shall be cancelled.

Protections in the National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska

Extending from the northwest slope of the Brooks Range to the Arctic Coast, the NPR-A encompasses roughly 23 million acres of public land managed by the BLM. Tribal Nations have occupied lands now within the NPR-A since time immemorial, and over 40 Indigenous communities continue to rely on subsistence activities in the reserve, harvesting caribou, shore and waterbirds, and many other fish and wildlife species, with many communities subsisting primarily from food harvested from the NPR-A.

Under the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act (NPRPA) of 1976, Congress directed the BLM to balance oil and gas development with the management and protection of sensitive landscapes – known as Special Areas – and surface resources across the reserve. The proposed rule is designed to assure maximum protection of Special Areas, as authorized under the NPRPA. The proposed rule would require that protections for Special Areas remain in place for as long as the values and characteristics in those areas are present, ensuring the durability of the protections into the future. The proposed rule also would require the BLM to review and gather public input – at least every five years – on whether existing special areas should be expanded, whether new special areas should be designated, and whether additional resources within special areas should be identified for protection. Upon finalization of the proposed rule, the Administration will follow this proposed process to inform the creation or expansion of additional special areas in the NPR-A.

The proposed rule would protect 13 million acres encompassed by the existing Special Areas by limiting future oil and gas leasing and industrial development in the Teshekpuk Lake, Utukok Uplands, Colville River, Kasegaluk Lagoon, and Peard Bay Special Areas – places collectively known for their globally significant intact habitat for wildlife, including grizzly and polar bears, caribou and hundreds of thousands of migratory birds. The rule would establish an outright prohibition on any new leasing in 10.6 million acres, more than 40 percent of the NPR-A.

The proposed rule would raise the bar for development throughout the NPR-A by establishing clear guidelines that are consistent with provisions of the current management plan for the reserve, the NPR-A Integrated Activity Plan (IAP). This current management

plan for the reserve was put in place in 2022, and effectively reversed the previous administration's IAP that sought to expand oil and gas leasing and development in the NPR-A and reduce protections for the Special Areas.

The proposed rulemaking would help protect subsistence uses throughout the NPR-A, responding to Alaska Native communities who have relied on the land, water and wildlife to support their way of life for thousands of years. It also advances the Biden-Harris administration's commitment to strengthening the role of Tribal governments in the management of public lands by encouraging the BLM to explore co-stewardship opportunities with Tribes for the Special Areas.

Seeking Public Comment

There will be a 45-day public review and comment period on the draft SEIS for the Coastal Plain. In developing the draft, the BLM and FWS engaged with a wide variety of stakeholders and used the best available data and science, including Indigenous Knowledge. For additional information, go to BLM's eplanning page.

The proposed NPR-A rule and map of the five NPR-A Special Areas as delineated in the 2022 IAP, are available for preview. A forthcoming publication of the proposed rule in the Federal Register will open a 60-day public comment period. During that time, the BLM will host in-person meetings in communities on the North Slope, as well as virtual public meetings to discuss the proposed rule. Details of those opportunities will be made available soon.

All,

Let's get this party started!

We have not yet received updated guidance from OMB for the 2025 President's Budget (PB) and are still assuming the timelines described in the A-11 are good. The 2025 President's Budget requires the recalculation of receipt estimates for the Department based on updated economic and policy assumptions and will be compared to the 2024 President's Budget across the 10-year budget window. While we wait for final guidance, we are sending this request to get you started preparing your data. The timeline always feels compressed, so we want to give you as much notice as possible.

Good news! ONRR's Actual Data for this exercise is attached to this email. We will pass on the OMB Economic Assumptions as soon as we receive them. Economic Assumptions are scheduled to be released on **Thursday**,

November 9th. Of course, as you know, OMB may adjust the Economic Assumptions release date slightly, and POB is committed to forwarding them to you as soon as they become available. *Reminder: A delay in the Economic Assumptions does not adjust the listed deadlines*.

The data you provide is important to us! As we continue to capture lessons learned from each budget cycle, we are identifying ways to improve our data collection and integrity while ensuring leadership can quickly and easily understand your submissions. We continue to strive to strengthen management controls, improve Bureau ownership

over numbers, and reduce risk in program outputs. By working together with you, we continue to ensure accurate receipt estimates in all our budget submissions.

As a part of our lessons learned from the 2024 President's Budget, POB piloted two deliverables during the 2024 Mid-Session cycle and collected feedback to finalize the requirements for these deliverables for the 2025 President's Budget. In addition to your customary estimate submissions, please plan to prepare the following:

- 1. **Executive Summary:** To communicate your estimates and assumptions more accurately through Departmental leadership and OMB, we are requesting a brief, narrative executive summary to accompany the commodity estimates. We know you'll be working quickly, so you have latitude on the format, but please make sure your summary minimally answers the following questions for the relevant commodities in your submission (e.g., oil, gas, renewable energy, coal, etc.):
 - a. What are the key assumptions included in your estimates?
 - b. How are these assumptions different than what was assumed in the last President's Budget?
 - c. What key policy decision and/or legislative direction are reflected in your assumptions?
 - d. How much of the estimated increase/decrease over the 10yr budget window is a result of the new economic assumptions vs other programmatic/policy assumptions?
 - e. How do your assumptions reflect current Administration priorities?

You will note on the schedule that we have staggered the due dates: your number estimates are due to POB first, followed by the narrative summary, the 10yr Explanations, and confirmation of estimates the following week. We know you need to focus on preparing the numbers first, then pulling the narrative about the assumptions together should hopefully be pretty straightforward.

- 2. **Bureau Entry of 10-year Bullet Explanations:** As we did in Mid-Session, we will leverage the POB External Communications SharePoint site to allow bureaus access to a shared document to provide bulleted explanatory notes for the estimates. We will update an Excel template that shows the outputs from the prior submission, the current submission, and the delta you provide quick notes about what caused the delta for each of the specific commodities.
 - a. **Note:** Keep in mind that your explanations for the lowest level commodity breakout may be different than the overall trend for a commodity. For example, oil and gas pricing in total may be decreasing, but a subset of oil and gas (say, rents and bonuses in a particular area, for example) may be *increasing* because of different lease sale or production assumptions. Please be sure your line-item commodity level explanation tracks with the delta for each line (so you don't talk about decreases on a line that's clearly increasing, etc.). If you have questions about this, please let us know.

Good news: These explanations are likely to form the more detailed basis for the explanations of assumptions you'll be providing in your Executive Summaries, so we believe these two tasks work nicely in tandem.

Clearance Requirements: We anticipate continued high levels of interest, significant leadership engagement, and additional review for receipt estimates again this cycle. To ensure adequate coordination, <u>please clear your</u> submission data and underlying assumptions through your Assistant Secretary by November 21st to finalize your submission. We recognize clearance of your inputs is generally standard practice, so we don't expect this to be a heavy lift. We are flagging the importance of clearance since we expect additional questions about the impact of statutory and policy direction on your assumptions and estimates.

A few process/procedure reminders:

- 1. **Use The Shared Mailbox**: All receipts data submissions must be submitted to POB via the shared Energy Receipts email (<u>OS_POB_Receipts@ios.doi.gov</u>) Use of this shared email allows better coverage and backup for this important function.
- 2. Remember to Submit Bureau-Populated Upload Templates: Please continue to complete the attached upload template with the appropriate estimates in thousands of dollars (in addition to your customary backup submissions). Your template will be uploaded directly into the receipts estimation and allocation model (REAM). Please do not make any formatting changes to the template(s). They are formatted specifically to upload into the model. Simply enter your updated estimates on the appropriate row in thousands of dollars.
- 3. **Bureau Validation**: Once estimates are uploaded in REAM, POB will ask you to confirm the estimates have been uploaded correctly (e.g. amounts are correctly reflected, correct values in the correct fiscal years, etc.) If you find something is in error, simply provide us a revised upload template with the corrected data, and we'll upload again until it's right.

OS POB Receipts@ios.doi.gov by Thursday, November 16th. As soon as we have uploaded your estimates, we will circle back with you for confirmation that the estimates have been uploaded correctly so you can get started loading your 10yr Explanations on our shared space HERE. We anticipate the explanations will be ready for you by Friday, November 17th. All 3 deliverables (the estimates, the executive summary(s) and the 10yr explanations) should be finalized and reviewed through your Assistant Secretary by Tuesday, November 21st.
